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this monograph examines changes in the american public school population from 1900 to 2010 it shows how different historical periods have affected the composition of the student body and have posed important challenges to those involved in shaping educational policy the author first develops an analytical framework that merges education and applied demography concepts the education concepts include

attendance promotion retention high school graduation and college enrollment while the applied demography concepts take into account size distribution and composition he then applies this framework to the four most recent american historical periods the progressive era the great depression the post wwii era and the post 1983 era readers will come to understand the changing socio demographic profile of american schools due to such factors as immigration from europe child labor laws internal migration greater fertility and the rise of the baby boom generation the changing status of women and minorities the urban crises rising social inequality the 2008 recession and globalization featuring both historical and current data this volume clearly shows how demographic change affects the teaching and learning environment education policy funding and school segregation overall it offers insightful analysis that may help shape the future of american education

a history of modern psychology the quest for a science of the mind describes the evolution of psychology into the twenty first century with coverage of recent events and findings that transform our understanding of the past with a topical approach that presents key thinkers within the context of schools of thought students are able to see how philosophers researchers and academics influenced one another to create the rich and diverse landscape of modern psychology in a global context in the new second edition the author expands coverage of unsung pioneers philosopher al balkhi zoologist charles henry turner psychiatrist grunya sukhareva and others revisits the legacy of francis galton explores the vygotsky boom and includes new discussion of the impact of philip zimbardo s stanford prison experiment through detailed timelines and features such as looking back and looking ahead ludden gives students a deeper appreciation for the transference of knowledge that shaped the field

since the time of turing computer scientists have dreamed of building artificial general intelligence agi a system that can think learn and act as humans do over recent years the remarkable pace of progress in machine learning research has reawakened discussions about agi but what would a generally intelligent agent be able to do what algorithms architectures or cognitive functions would it need to answer these questions we turn to the study of natural intelligence humans and many other animals have evolved precisely the sorts of generality of function that ai researchers see as the defining hallmark of intelligence the fields of cognitive science and neuroscience have provided us with a language for describing the ingredients of natural intelligence in terms of computational mechanisms and cognitive functions and studied their implementation in neural circuits natural general intelligence describes the algorithms and architectures that are driving progress in ai research in this language by comparing current ai systems and biological brains side by side in doing so it addresses deep conceptual issues concerning how perceptual memory and control systems work and discusses the language in which we think and the structure of our knowledge it also grapples with longstanding controversies about the nature of intelligence and

whether ai researchers should look to biology for inspiration ultimately summerfield aims to provide a bridge between the theories of those who study biological brains and the practice of those who are seeking to build artificial brains

and understand of the world do their emotions feel like our own do they love like we do what do they think of us since our alliance first began on the hunt and on the farm our relationship with dogs has evolved considerably and with domestic dog population rising twenty per cent in the last decade alone it is a bond that will continue to evolve in order to gauge where our relationship with dogs goes from here author and zoologist jules howard takes a look at the historical paths we have trod together and at the many scientists before him who turned their analytic eye on their own four legged companions charles darwin and his contemporaries toyed with dog sign language and made special puzzle boxes and elaborate sniff tests using old socks later the same questions drove pavlov and pasteur to unspeakable cruelty in their search for knowledge since then leagues of psychologists and animal behaviourists have built upon the study of dogs and their much improved methods have fetched increasingly important results dogs have episodic memory similar to ours they recognise themselves as individuals and in addition to their expert sense of smell dogs noses can even detect thermal radiation with the help of vets ethologists neurologists historians and naturally his own dogs wonderdog reveals the study of dogs to be key in the advancement of compassion in scientific research and crucial to making life on earth better for all species

this book examines the conduct and purposes of educational research it looks at values of researchers at whose interests are served by the research and the inclusion or exclusion of practitioners and subjects of research it asks if educational research should be explicitly committed to promoting equality and inclusion and whether that

requires research to be more aware of the cultural and global contexts of research questions it explores the ethical challenges encountered in the conduct of research and the potential ethical and social justice constraints imposed by comparative research rankings next it discusses the research funding aspects of the above issues both philosophically and historically thus examining the changing sources patterns and effects of educational research funding over time since the conduct of most educational research increasingly requires institutional and financial support the question is whether funding shapes the content of research and what counts as research the book discusses if funding is a factor in the shift of efforts of researchers from pure or basic research to more applied research and if it encourages the development of large research teams to the detriment of individual scholars it looks at the ownership of the content results and data of publicly funded research finally it tries to establish whether scholars solicit funding to support research projects or generate research projects to attract funding this publication as well as the ones that are mentioned in the preliminary pages of this work were realized by the research community philosophy and history of the discipline of education purposes projects and practices of educational research
